From the President's Desk

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Dear Friends,

This past September 20th-22nd, the USCSI held its annual meeting at the retreat house of San Damiano in Danville, California. Present were our Episcopal Moderator, Bishop Mark Rivituso, as well as delegates and/or principal officers of 16 secular institutes...a total of 24 in all, with nine Zoom participants. The presenter was Fr. John O'Neill of Voluntas Dei on the topic "Secular Consecration: Falling in Love Again." Fr. O'Neill was, to sum it up in one word, terrific. Erudite, funny, and clearly in love with his own vocation, Father told us his job was to get us excited about our vocations and I think he succeeded.

Some points which struck me focused on the reality of the complete integration of the secular and the consecrated in our lives, which defines us in the world. They are not separated; we are at once immersed in the world but coming from a place of deep prayer and the vows and promises which we have made. Another point was that Jesus (though of course High Priest and Lord of all) was a lay person, converting people in the world through his kindness, his gentleness, his teachings, his forgiveness, his mercy, his miracles.

During the weekend, topics discussed included the relationship between clergy and members of consecrated life—what were the similarities and differences, how can one support the other, and what could be done to further these relationships. Also addressed briefly was the Jubilee Year for Consecrated Life in 2025. More information will be coming as to how secular institutes can participate, both in this country and in Rome in 2025.

The survey at the end by those present indicated that they were enriched by the presentations, discussions, praying together, Liturgies of the Eucharist, and getting to know one another.

Our next conference will take place at the Bon Secours Retreat Center in Marriottsville, Maryland, the weekend of September 26th-28th, 2025. Come one, call all!

National Meeting at San Damiano Center in Danville, California



Heart-warming, informative, uplifting, entertaining-in the right sense! These are four descriptions heard of the presentations from Fr John O'Neill, Voluntas Dei Institute, at the annual national meeting of the US Conference of Secular Institutes. **Secular Consecration: Falling In Love Again.** Fr John began by saying what I am giving on to you is nothing new. You have heard it all. **My job isn't to inform you, but to excite you** to go back to your secular institutes and parishes and get others excited about this vocation!

We looked at an excerpt from a letter to *Diognetus* (Nn. 5-6; Funk, 397-401): The Christians in the World. This is a template from the 2nd century of the Church as to how baptized people were to live. Fr John notes: Since most of us were baptized as infants, what we remember are the sacraments that we receive later. **In the early Church you took a serious risk to be baptized!**

This Document, found in the Liturgy of the Hours, is a **summary of Secular Institute life...** We **LIVE like other people.** How many of our founders have emphasized: **Be NORMAL, be attractive personalities, not weird.** Example: Talk about Baseball every now and then, don't have visions, and be anchored in prayer. Imagine Jesus reminding you: "You witness to me!"

"Christians are indistinguishable from other men either by nationality, language or customs. They do not inhabit separate cities of their own, or speak a strange dialect, or follow some outlandish way of life. Their teaching is not based upon reveries inspired by the curiosity of men. Unlike some other people, they champion no purely human doctrine. With regard to dress, food, and manner of life in general, they follow the customs of whatever city they happen to be living in, whether it is Greek or foreign.

And yet there is something extraordinary about their lives. They live in their own countries as though they were only passing through. They play their full role as citizens, but labor under all the disabilities of aliens. Any country can be their homeland, but for them their homeland, wherever it may be, is a foreign country. ...

They live in the flesh, but they are not governed by the desires of the flesh. They pass their days upon earth, but they are citizen of heaven. Obedient to the laws, they yet live on a level that transcends the law. Christians love all men, but all men persecute them. Condemned because they are not understood, they are put to death, but raised to life again. They live in poverty, but enrich many; they are totally destitute, but possess an abundance of everything. They suffer dishonor, but that is their glory. They are defamed, but vindicated. A blessing is their answer to abuse, deference their response to insult. For the good they do they receive the punishment of malefactors, but even then they rejoice, as though receiving the gift of life. They are attacked by the Jews as aliens, they are persecuted by the Greeks, yet no one can explain the reason for this hatred." -Please follow link to read the last two paragraphs:

National Meeting Hosted 16 Secular Institutes September 20-22, 2024

Father John continues: **Why are we so disliked?? Because we bother people – we should be a PAIN!** Be a pain to others, not by being rude or uncivil... Recognize that we must speak up more for Christ, his radical way of living, and the goal of our lives. Prick their conscience. If we would have more excitement and joy in all we do following Jesus – then people will come toward us! **Show genuine interest in others.** Children, students, frazzled business execs, retirees – ALL want to come back when there is an experience of loving care – a home – a selfless heart!

In the language of Hans Urs von Balthasar: Yes, we live on the edge. **We are something utterly unique and identified by Life on the Edge.** Practically, **our life is never settled.** If you join a religious order, take vows, and set/done. With secular institutes it is a work in progress! **We don't start in a monastery and go into the world. We start in the world and stay there!** Because we live in secular circumstances holding together consecration and secularity. It is a hard vocation because we pull together two things that never flow together and it never gets fixed. We are NOT a Half Thing! The Church needs to instruct people that we are fully aware of being committed to the three counsels right where we are. It is not easy as we stand on the edge between the secular world and the total consecration of heart to God!

My consecration touches EVERYTHING that I do in my life. It is not *secular OR sacred*. If I type for insurance companies, I should not wish to be in a holier place. We must see ourselves **IN** the mystery of the incarnation, **IN** the world. So, being in parish adoration or typing finance for my grumpy boss is the exact same.

Life on the Edge: living secularity and living total consecration come together. We are right on that **EDGE** of where both meet! Sometimes one or the other gets lost and we have a tough vocation to hold the two things together... As consecrated lay members of secular institutes our secular job is vitally connected to the sacred. It is never NOT connected in a God-centered reality. Both, my secularity in being with both feet in the midst of the world and my ongoing consecration to holiness, are intertwined as we journey and go forth building the Kingdom of God.



Refueling in Body, Mind, Heart and Soul—Count Me In—We Need This!



During the National Meeting, ideas were spawned in small groups as to what “Best Practices” could be implanted for the coming Holy Year as Pilgrims of Hope – Living Consecrated Life.

How can we better live the balance between consecration and secularity?

+ Self-understood, we want to help and support others. We need to be the bridge builders. Let’s be instrumental in offering a National Synod on Consecrated Life.

+ We need to pray for Vocations for priests and all forms of Consecrated Life.

+ We want to support life-giving relationships, as priests may feel isolated, and show appreciation.

+ Offer catechism and faith formation on how vocations interact in the Church. Dare to give on help and compassion, along with our professional advice.

+ Teach about SIs in seminaries; reinforce commonalities as we are all building the church. Each vocation has difficulties and gifts to share.

+ If clergy has personal contact with members of secular institutes, then they can better understand! Clear up the misconceptions.

+ We have the same mission and we are on the same team – we just have different mission fields. Our secular institute specialty is to serve in All aspects of life; for this we need to have correct terminology. Pope St John Paul II wanted to re-write the 1978 *Mutual Relations* - update this document. Send a representative to Rome for the October 8-12, 2025, Consecrated Life Jubilee.

Sue Larkin was elected USCSI President for a second three year term, and St Louis was deemed the site of our 2026 national gathering.

Some evaluation comments included:

-Loved Fr John’s presentation which really made me appreciate my professional work as the apostolate.

-Need more communal prayer, times of Eucharistic Adoration; and how we can build bridges to people fallen away or fully unchurched.

-Could we find a time that would allow younger non-retired members to come?



Don't be left in the cold – Three steps to take for the coming Holy Year of 2025

1. READ THE BULL OF INDICTION OF THE ORDINARY JUBILEE OF THE YEAR 2025

Since Old Testament times, Leviticus 25:8–13, a jubilee year was prescribed. The recent ordinary jubilee years occur every 25 years. The Proclamation Document or Bull of Indiction as it is called, is solemnly read on the Feast of the Ascension.

Pope Francis Announced the Opening and Closing dates of the Holy Doors of the Jubilee 2025 in Rome from December 24, 2024, to ending on January 6, 2026 with the theme: **"Pilgrims of Hope."** The opening paragraph reads:

1. *SPES NON CONFUNDIT*. "Hope does not disappoint" (*Rom 5:5*). In the spirit of hope, the Apostle Paul addressed these words of encouragement to the Christian community of Rome. Hope is also the central message of the coming Jubilee that, in accordance with an ancient tradition, the Pope proclaims every twenty-five years. My thoughts turn to all those *pilgrims of hope* who will travel to Rome in order to experience the Holy Year and to all those others who, though unable to visit the City of the Apostles Peter and Paul, will celebrate it in their local Churches. For everyone, may the Jubilee be a moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the "door" (cf. *Jn 10:7.9*) of our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always, everywhere and to all as "our hope" (*1 Tim 1:1*).

May the light of hope be able to reach all people, as a message of God's love addressed to all. And may the Church be a faithful witness of this announcement in all parts of the world.

2. "WALK WITH ONE" IS PART OF THE THIRD YEAR OF THE NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL

For the [Year of Mission](#) and inspired by the parable of the Good Shepherd leaving the 99 sheep to find a single lost one, *Walk With One* initiative encourages each of us to act as instruments of Christ in reaching out to those who have drifted from the Church.

Identify Someone: "Spend a little time in prayer, asking the Holy Spirit to show you whom he wants you to accompany," the Revival noted that you might be surprised by who God shows you needs your particular support.

Intercede for Them: "Lift them up in your prayers, asking God to prepare their heart for whatever he has in store. Stay attuned to the voice of the Holy Spirit, and ask him to guide you in being a vessel of his grace," the release stated.

Connect in Eucharistic Friendship: This third step should involve developing a relationship, "rooted in compassion," like the Good Shepherd has with his lost one by listening to their story, sharing your story, and offering continual support.

Invite to Action: The final step is to encourage them to take tangible steps of any size to come back home. "Whether it's inviting them to join you for Mass, a small group, or a service opportunity," the release stated, "the Holy Spirit will lead you in guiding the person he wants to call home to Christ and his Church." "If every active Catholic brings just one person into an encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist, it will be a remarkable revival for our time!" changing lives! -*CatholicVote.org*

Together, Let Us Renew the Sunday Rest

Ever since I read about the melancholy that would come upon St Therese when Sunday evenings were about to end, I noticed that the further one distanced oneself from the true meaning of the Lord's Day, the deeper the melancholy could become. When the Catholic World Report published this piece on [September 1, 2024](#) [John M. Grondelski, Ph.D. The Dispatch 8 Print](#) Editor Carl XX was asked and gave reprint permission.

"Sunday scaries" [refers](#) to the "unique anxiousness that Sunday nights bring." It's the awareness—sometimes creeping, sometimes sudden—that another ["manic Monday"](#) is imminent. (At this time of year, it's often accompanied by a related syndrome, the "summer-is-over" shock).

The first time I ran into the "Sunday scaries" was by reading the Sunday *New York Times*. Cody Delistraty's September 1 essay—["How Should We Mourn the End of Summer?"](#)—on the end of summer (riffing on his book about "grief") happened to mention them as "the dread or nervousness about the forthcoming workweek."

Separately, the *Times* usually runs a puff column about how somebody spends his Sunday. This week, it was about a food writer who's now found a niche getting people to cut back on alcohol. Her Sunday routine consists of checking her Fitbit to see if her sleep had enough REM time, followed by a run, a stop at a local bakery, tuna-and-quinoa sandwiches at a local café, a tennis session, supper at an Italian restaurant. I guess her "Sunday scaries" set in during her "skin care routine."

I have yet to read a "spending Sundays" column that mentioned including the Lord in the Lord's Day. The classical Judaeo-Christian vision of how to spend the Sabbath—Saturday or Sunday—included two elements: worship with contemplation and abstention from work. To borrow a John Paul II image, today's moderns are marking Sundays breathing with one lung: they don't work, but they don't worship, either. Sunday is not *just* about God. It's about man, too. It's about humans regularly encountering what Fribourg philosopher Jozef Bochenski once called the "existential questions." Why am I here? What am I doing with my life? What's the meaning of it all? What's my purpose? ..."

Grondelski raises points that weekends are a chance to do the necessary life things, left undone in a hectic over-hour workweek, or to chill and sleep. Covid has erased many a thought of embracing a full-time, regular job that one enjoys going to. "Traumatic is the term about what preceding generations probably just called 'life.'"

*Ask yourself if you couldn't improve on **how** you spend your Sundays, as Grondelski concludes:*

"Yes, people should rest and enjoy themselves. But if the high point of one's Sunday midday is a debate over tuna and quinoa sandwiches, doesn't that say something about what *might be missing* in that day? And shouldn't *that* be scarier than the arrival of "just another manic Monday?" -John M. Grondelski (Ph.D., Fordham) was former associate dean of the School of Theology, Seton Hall University, South Orange, NJ



Meaningful Ways to Express Your Gratitude

3. Spend Time Together

Time spent together is never wasted – especially if it's to show appreciation for a kind word or action. If you're unable to meet in person, try scheduling a time to virtually enjoy a meal together or have a coffee – it may not be the same as seeing each other in person, but it's still meaningful!

4. Smile – It Does More Than You May Ever Realize!

A smile carries more weight than you might think. For some, a smile says more than words ever can – and therefore, can mean the world to someone. If you're at a loss for words the next time you'd like to express your gratitude, try a smile – not only will it make you feel good, but it will make the other person feel good, too. "Say thank you with a beautiful smile, kindness costs us nothing." -Myra

5. Pay It Back or Pay It Forward

If you are wanting to show appreciation for someone, returning the favor can be a great way to do it. Help them in their garden, deliver a favorite dessert, or send them a few dollars for a coffee on you. Gestures like these can make their whole day brighter. If the person you'd like to show appreciation to is a total stranger, pay it forward by doing the same for the person behind you. Kindness can set off a chain reaction, and you could be a part of it.

6. A Simple "Thank You" Says It All

Sometimes the most powerful way to express gratitude is to simply say 'thank you.' These two words are so significant, and can make a huge impact when said to someone that you are truly grateful for. Words are powerful, and when you can see the meaning in someone's eyes as they say them, it makes them even more so. However, if you can't say thank you in person, you can always do so over the phone. "Nothing tops a sincere 'thank you!'" -Natalie



Accepting Gratitude

It's an interesting conundrum – often-times, we find it easier to share appreciation than to receive it. It can feel awkward and uncomfortable to receive compliments or someone else's gratitude for something that may not have seemed like a big deal to you.

Here are a few tips to help you accept gratitude the next time it comes your way:

- **Allow yourself to experience happiness.** You are allowed to feel happy that an action you took made someone else grateful. Smile, and say 'you're welcome.' They will see that you mean it.
- **Say "thank you" in return.** If someone has given you a gift or a compliment in order to show their gratitude, savor the moment and say 'thank you,' they will appreciate the moment that you've shared together.
- **Take a breath before responding.** When being shown gratitude, often it can be best to pause before we say anything. This will give us the time to say what we would truly like to say, rather than the first thing that comes to mind.

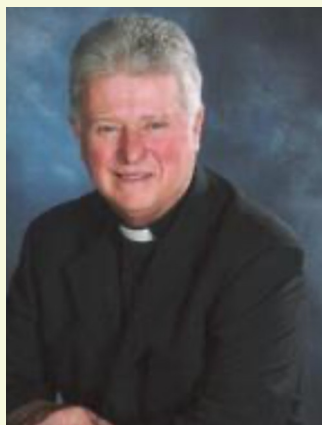

St. Paul wrote that God “chose us in [Christ] . . . to be holy” (Ephesians 1:4).
